Who are they? When and where do they meet? What do they do? The Applique Addicts sit & stitch group can be considered some of our guild's finest appliquéers and needle-workers. Come meet them as they showcase their handiwork which is guaranteed to awe and inspire you.

Upcoming Programs

April – Mini Demonstrations

Five stations will be arranged around the room for you to get up close and personal, learn and ask questions.

Station: Perfect Circles: Marsha Walper will show you two methods to make perfectly smooth, round circles for hand applique. You will be amazed how easy these techniques are.

Station: Folded Flower: Linda O'Sullivan will demonstrate how to create a folded hexagon from a circle.

Station: Batting Selection: The right batting makes a difference! Wendy Stone will explain the myriad of batting terms and which product to choose based on your quilting style and project. Each participant will receive a take-home brochure with 8 batting samples.

Station: Flying Geese: Two easy methods to create a flying geese unit will be demonstrated. Both methods are easy and will result in faster creation and uniform units for your quilts.

Station: Hexagons with English Paper Piecing: Karen Kunz will show you her organized method and share easy tips for creating hexagons with the English paper piecing method.

May – Guest Speaker: Suzanne Marshall

June – “Stitcher Friendly Advice for Everybody!”

Hours spent quilting, working on crafts, or sitting at a computer take a toll on our body. Yoga can help relieve tension, relax muscles, and counteract the effects of repetitive movements. Hattie Pennie and Dawn Griffin will share some yoga poses and stretches to help reduce tension and stress in your shoulders, neck, arms and wrists that can be done sitting in a chair or standing. No yoga experience is necessary. A yoga mat is not required. Please wear loose, comfortable clothing and supportive, non-slip shoes. Participating in this program will feel so sweet. Namaste.

February/March Philanthropic Challenge: For the Love of Cats!

Please consider making and bringing to the March QU meetings at least two (2) cat quilts for the following local programs.

Treats, Inc.: a non-profit organization that pays for spaying and neutering animals. They sell the quilts to raise money for their organization and some quilts are shared with the Leon County Animal Shelter.

It's Meow Or Never: (IMON) is gearing up to hold their annual For Cats' Sake Art Auction on April 21. IMON is a feral cat rescue, adoption, and fostering non-profit organization.

Specifications for Cat Quilts: Machine piece and quilt using only good quality cotton fabric. No flannel or fuzzy fabrics as this is harmful to cats. Recommended sizes: between 20" wide and 30" long suitable for cat cages/boxes.

Don't forget to save the UPC labels from packages of Hobbs batting. These will help with us obtaining discounted batting for guild philanthropic projects.

Annual Capital City Quilt Show

Did you know the Museum Quilt Show is more than you might imagine? The show is held at the Florida Museum of History, Florida, as in the **State of Florida**. AND, Tallahassee Quilters Unlimited is the **ONLY** quilt guild in the state to have this honor. QU has been doing this for 35 years. 2018 will be the 36th show. That's some BIG doings!!!

In line with this for this, for our 36th annual show, we are stepping up our game and becoming more professional in how we do things. Here are a few items to which you can look forward:

- 1 – A revised, clear, concise entry form
- 2 – Set dates and times for all things show related
- 3 – Show and tell explanations of requirements for entry at Guild meetings.

Entry forms will be available on line after the March Guild meeting. I will have a couple of paper entry forms for those who do not have computer access. Do not request a paper entry if you have a computer and internet access. Thank you for your cooperation with this. Entries are due by midnight after the July Guild meeting which is July 12th. Let me rephrase that – **THE DEADLINE FOR ENTRIES IS MIDNIGHT OF JULY 12, 2018**. Do not wait until the last minute. Do not call me or anybody else on Friday morning (July 13th) or maybe even Saturday morning (July 14th) and give us some fairytale about why we should accept your entry after the deadline. Thinking about calling Monday, July 16 and telling me you were out of town, didn't have internet access, the creek went dry, the chickens quit laying their eggs and the boat sprung a leak? Let me repeat: **The entry deadline is midnight July 12, 2018**. You have four (4) months in which to enter your quilt.

A word about **Challenge quilts**: You purchased the rules and you made a winning Challenge quilt? Guess what? You, too, must complete an entry form for the show to have your quilt hang in the Museum. Just because it is a Challenge quilt, doesn't mean you automatically get that quilt in the Museum Show. You, too, must complete and transmit an entry form.

Turn in day for your quilts is: Saturday, August 18, 2018. IF you will be out of town or otherwise unavailable at this time and on this date, get a friend to turn in your quilt. This is the **ONLY** day and the **ONLY** time frame for quilt drop off. Do not be insulted if you ask me to take your quilt to the Museum for you and I tell you no. I have back issues and will do well to carry in my own quilt. Thanks for your understanding.

The show dates are: August 31, 2018 through October 28, 2018.

The Preview Reception is Thursday, August 30, 2018. Plan to attend. It is a great time.

The day for pick-up is November 3, 2018, again between 10 am and 12 noon. Put this on your schedule, set an alarm, and make arrangements to get your quilt.

Annual Capital City Quilt Show (Continued)

There are a few items most of us know about which are required for a quilt entry. To remind members who have been in the Guild for a time as well as let newer members know here are a few things to remember:

1. **Your quilt requires a pillowcase for protection and identification.** Put your name and your best contact phone number on the pillowcase. I used a Sharpie on an old pillowcase which followed me home from some hospital. Perfect fit.
2. **Your quilt requires a label on the back lower right corner.** Put your name, the quilt title, where quilt was constructed and completion year on your label. There are many options to making a label. Since my embroidery machine died, I create my labels in WORD and print it on a piece of muslin with my computer's printer. If you don't know how to do this, ask me.
3. **Last but certainly not least – your quilt REQUIRES a hanging sleeve.** I'll be talking about these sleeves at the March guild meeting but here are a few things to remember: The sleeve must be able to accommodate a board being put through it, so the sleeve has to have some give to it. Please do not bring your quilt to the Museum on turn-in day without a sleeve attached to the back of your quilt. It is not possible for the Museum to display a quilt without a sleeve. So, if that is the case with yours, it will not be accepted. P.S. See the video on the QU website or checkout the one on AQS.com.

About those entry forms – enter early and enter often. We are hoping for, and quite frankly, expecting a large number of entries. Should we get to a point where a choice must be made for whose quilt is hung and whose quilt is not hung in the show, preference will be given to those who entered early. There will be no late entries, right???

Bet on that!

The Museum staff has awesome new ideas for education Saturdays, children's activities, history of quilting and more. More on this to follow.

- o Viewer's choice voting ends 1 week before the show ends.
- o NO king size bed quilts will be accepted for entry.
- o NEEDED NOW: Ribbon making diva or committee of divas to make ribbons for winners and first-time entrants.



The Silent Auction occurs in conjunction with the Annual Capital City Quilt Show held at the R.A. Gray Museum. Items to be auctioned are donated by guild members. No quilt show application form is needed for these items.

Any sewed or quilted item is acceptable; i.e., quilts, wall hangings, clothing, bags, purses, pillows, potholders, place mats, table runners, notebook covers, necklaces, ragdolls.

Donated items should be brought to a regular monthly guild meeting. The deadline is the last meeting before the scheduled turn-in day at the Museum. This year it is the August meeting.

Quilts and wall hangings must have a four-inch hanging sleeve and may have a label on the back with a title, quilter or guild name, and date of completion.

If you do not attach a label, please give me a paper with your name and a title or description along with the quilt.

I will be accepting items at each meeting beginning this month. Thank you for your participation!

I look forward to seeing where the theme leads quilters this year. To date we have thirty-nine (39) entries. There are plenty of rules left. If you have never attempted this challenge maybe this is your year to win!

As a useful definition, according to Wikipedia:

"Out of the blue" is an informal English language idiom that describes an event that occurs unexpectedly, without any warning or preparation. It is used as an adverb. The "blue" in the phrase [usually] refers to the sky, one from which a sudden thunderstorm is unexpected.

Please don't let this definition limit your creativity and ideas. The challenge is open to all quilters both our traditional quilters and our art quilters—new quilters and experienced quilters. Entry must be made by a single individual. As always, keep your challenge a secret. To find out more about the challenge, you can purchase your challenge rules from Hattie Pennie, Chair who will be sitting at the Challenge table before and during our meetings. You may purchase these rules for \$5.00. This is “not” a fundraiser – all funds raised from rule purchases will be awarded as prizes for best quilts. We would like to see many “Out of the Blue” quilts turned in for guild member voting and for the museum show. At this time our challenge quilt reveal and voting are scheduled for our August 9, 2018 guild meeting.

Evelyn first learned about the need for 4H sewing volunteers the summer of 2014 through service work with the Tallahassee Chapter of the American Sewing Guild (ASG). When asked why she choose to volunteer with 4-H, Evelyn replied:

"Volunteering is always gratifying. There is a need and you are trying to fill it. Working with youth is stimulating and rewarding. They are smart, fast, and funny. They make me laugh. You learn about what makes kids tick, what their concerns are, and you continue learning about what you're teaching [sewing]."

The cost of sewing materials is the number one concern for the continual operation of the Leon County 4-H Sewing Club. Fees are necessary for some projects, but Evelyn solicits friends and fellow members of the American Sewing and Quilters Unlimited Guilds for their "no-longer-wanted." Evelyn also actively repurposes fabric and other sewing materials for new projects for the children.

One parent stated, ***"Ms. Evelyn is so patient with the children. She clearly puts a lot of work and energy into every meeting. The children leave with increased confidence and skill, which is evident from the huge smiles on their faces. We so appreciate Ms. Evelyn, as well as the other volunteers that give so generously of their time. The children are inspired, as well as challenged, to do more than they thought they could."***

The 4-H Stitch Stars meet the 1st and 3rd Thursdays at the Extension Office, 615 Paul Russell Rd. (behind the fairgrounds) from

6-8 pm. We follow the LCSO calendar, including holidays and spring and summer breaks.

For those thinking about volunteering with Florida 4-H, Evelyn has this advice: ***"Don't be afraid to work with someone different than you. We know we're all busy, but we have committed volunteers who show up for Stitch Stars meetings nonetheless. I marvel that they carve out some time on a Thursday evening to come help teach sewing. Share the load. Work with a team."***
