Shelley Swanland will be sharing her Cathedral Window techniques. Shelley has developed a machine technique to produce these beautiful traditionally hand-pieced quilts.

Thursday's lecture is "Catherdaral Windows and More" and highlights Shelley's trunk show of her work since she developed her technique in 1998. She will show us her quilts as well as entertain us with her stories and anecdotes of her experiences in the world of quilt designing.

Friday, March 15: Cathedral Window Sampler Learn to make a Cathedral Window quilt completely by machine using 3 dimensional piecing. We'll learn the basics then put it all together in a sampler.

Saturday, March 16: Easy Cathedral Window Flowers

A new technique makes fun and easy flowers using simple squares and rectangles, layered piecing and features rolled bias curves, embroidery and beading. A great intro into the technique and uses either hand or machine methods for finishing.

Cut, Cut, Cut! Wow! Did you see all those scrappy quilts that Bonnie Hunter brought to our November meeting? Were you in awe of her cutting scraps into manageable strips ahead of time? Me too J But then didn't sign up for any of her classes because the thought of starting yet another quilt before you finished your UFOs was overwhelming? Especially since you had no precut strips or blocks? If you are like me, your intentions were good. Mine were. I bought Bonnies's book, String Fling: Scrappy, Happy and Loving it! And I had already bought three huge storage containers for the new precut strips. Heaven knows, my quilting studio is overflowing with scraps of every color and size and wadded up ball known to woman. That's not even mentioning that I recently sprung big bucks for the super big and sharp rotary cutter. Not the little dorky medium sized cutter that I've used forever. Sure, it was sharp and cut well with a ruler-but so boring and safe. Do you know that in over 20 years of using the 45 size—I've never once accidently cut myself? Not even a nick? Well a couple months ago that changed and I bought a BIG BOY! Yes-the 60 size-special tungsten steel blade, unleashes the blade on either side, balanced handle—in fact, so balanced that for the first time in my life, I'm cutting four layers of fabric on a curve-freehanded! And still no injuries J But now I'm rolling free-easy-sharp-hey I'm cruising the cutting edge! And what is the point of all this crazy rambling, you ask? Why should you care or even give a rat's ass that one of your quilting sisters has armed up with the largest and potentially most lethal rotary cutter on the planet and is ready to cut, cut, < cut?</p> cut? Why, of course, I'm trying to find like-minded pals who would like to start a whole different kind of sit and stitch groupwhere there is no sitting or stitching! Instead we will bring rotary cutters, cutting mats, rulers, scraps, and our storage containers and cut, cut, cut, until our wadded up scraps are all turned into manageable strips and blocks. If there are even five or six ladies who would like to do this one morning a week, until we get our scraps cut and manageable and organized in their storage units, I would be willing to try and find us a meeting place.
